# Step 1: Making a difference

Discuss which are the easiest and which are the most difficult to achieve and why.


Can you describe the difference between tactics such as protesting, civil disobedience, lobbying and voting for change.

# Step 2: Handwriting a letter to your 'prospective' MP



Every year during London Climate Action Week (LCAW) we have a <u>Student-MP</u> <u>Climate Surgery</u> organised by GLOBE Legislators. But this year LCAW (22-30 June 2024) takes place in the run-up to the General Election on 4<sup>th</sup> July and we don't know who our next MP will be. That's why this year instead of a Climate Surgery we're suggesting you write to your prospective MP – the ones who want to be your MP.

In this activity you are going to hand write a letter to your prospective local MP..

### Handwriting Letter writing tips:

- Do a rough draft first
- Choose your pen
- Tell the 'Prospective MP' who you are (name, school etc as appropriate).
- Tell the MP why you are writing and how they can help – we have included a sample letter on the next slide which you can use to get you started
- Sign your letter
- Give the letter to your teacher

# Context

London Climate Action Week is between 22 June to 30 June 2024. This year all London schools are invited to take part in the Schools Climate Summit taking place from 24 June to 28 June. Each day of the Summit will engage with one of the Summit's five major themes – the four 'C's and the one 'F' – Campus, Curriculum, Community, Careers and Finance. It's a great opportunity to link curriculum-based climate change learning with global and social learning for the Sustainable Development Goals and encourage pupils to practise social action for change.
